
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

Dear Friends,

At our Mother's Union meeting for St David's Day, we heard how David travelled to Jerusalem, where he was made a bishop. We were shown a picture of the Mappa Mundi, a mediaeval map from Hereford Cathedral, which shows Jerusalem at it's centre. For European Christians, that city was the centre of the world: for the Jewish people it is the holiest city, and in ancient days was thought to be God's home: for the Muslim people it is the third holiest site.

In the next few days we will be reminded of the importance of Jerusalem in our own faith, as we follow the journey of Jesus in his last days on earth from the triumphal entry into the city on Palm Sunday, through our Stations of the Cross as he stumbles through the streets with his cross, to his wonderful resurrection in the Garden of Gethsemane. A week of sadness, pain and fear ending in joy.

The terrible war between Israel and Gaza continues, and sadly, during this Islamic holy month of Ramadan, as many Muslims go to Jerusalem to worship, there are fears that violence could spread to Jerusalem itself. We pray with our brothers and sisters of other faiths that we will learn to recognise in each other the image of God; that Jerusalem may be a place

where we can unite and worship God, and will once more be a place of joy.



Thanks to all who have gathered together to make this a warm and comfortable experience.










My Favourite Hymn -And Can it Be?

Another hymn by the great hymnwriter Charles Wesley. I have written previously about two of my favourites – 'Love Divine' and 'Love's redeeming work is done' – both by Wesley, and this is again a moving



and inspirational hymn to sing. It is often considered to be the best-loved of Wesley's huge creation of over six thousand hymns. It was written in 1738 to celebrate Wesley's conversion to Christianity.

Born in 1707, Charles was the eighteenth child of Samuel and Susanna Wesley. He had a sound and comprehensive education, and with his brother John went on to study at Christ College, Oxford where he took his degree in 1729, and then became a college tutor.

While in Oxford Charles and John formed a group called the 'Holy Club' which met weekly and aimed to live holy lives, setting aside time for prayer, examining their spiritual lives, and studying the Bible. Their fellow students found their approach extremely methodical and so they became known as 'Methodists.' The rest, as they say, is history.

'And Can it Be' was first published in 1739 in John Wesley's hymnal 'Hymns and Sacred Poems' and had the title 'Free Grace'. Written by Charles in 1738, its words portray the great spiritual change he was going through. If you read the verses you can almost visualise his personal salvation and subsequent conversion to Christianity.

His diary, in May of that year, gives minute details of the mental and spiritual struggles through which he passed, and then the ultimate triumph, expressed in the words of the final verse – 'No condemnation now I dread; Jesus, and all in Him, is mine.'

Early publications of 'And Can it Be' set the words to a variety of tunes. Today we sing it the tune 'Sagina', composed by Yorkshireman Thomas Campbell in 1825. Campbell liked to give his tunes botanical names, and 'Sagina' is named after a small moss-like plant with white flowers.

Pentecost - Time to Party Sunday May 19th

There are three "mega-festivals" commemorated in the Christian calendar. The first two, Christmas and Easter, are well known, but even Christians may not be as familiar with the third, the festival of Pentecost.



What is Pentecost?

Pentecost is the great festival that marks the day the Christian church began to grow through the power of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost means "fiftieth day" and is celebrated fifty days after Easter.

What happened at Pentecost?

After Jesus ascended into heaven, the twelve apostles, Jesus' mother and family, and many other of His disciples gathered together in Jerusalem for Pentecost, a Jewish harvest festival. While they were indoors praying, a sound like that of a rushing wind filled the house and tongues of fire descended and rested over each of their heads. This was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The disciples were

suddenly empowered to proclaim the gospel of the risen Christ.

All was changed.
Filled with joy and excitement, they went out into the streets of Jerusalem and with no fear, began preaching to the crowds.



By a miracle of the Holy Spirit they spoke in the native languages of the people present, who had come from all corners of the Roman Empire. The apostle Peter addressed the crowd, preaching to them about Jesus' death and resurrection for the forgiveness of sins. About three thousand were baptized that day, and so this day has become known as the 'birthday of the church.'

Why is Pentecost sometimes called 'Whitsunday?

A tradition of some churches in ancient times was to baptize adult converts to the faith at Pentecost. The newly baptized would wear white robes on that day, so Pentecost was often called "Whitsunday" or "White Sunday."

So, lets celebrate!

So, as Pentecost is the birthday of the church, its time to celebrate. Most of us will remember the Whitsun Treat in days gone by, best clothes on, a trip out, perhaps to the seaside, or into the country-side, usually a picnic.

In our churches now, we have cake - white icing for Whitsun with

candles of course and red flame recorations - and decorate the church with red to symbolise the joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. We'll even have red balloons!

Priests wear red vestments - please wear something red too!

A VISIT TO PARLIAMENT: nd In Good Company

It has been several months in the making after tentative dates were bandied back and forth, but finally I am to London, despite the rigours of a railway trade unions' work-to-rule and strike action, for a visit to the Houses of Parliament and this time in the company of Lord Edward (Ted) Rowlands. There is none better as a guide around these precincts, he is a student over many years of Parliament, its history and its workings and remains so in the House of Lords at present.

I have had to stand the whole journey from Cardiff railway station to London (along with several score of other passengers. The usual ten coaches arrive at Cardiff as five only (signs of the work-to-rule/overtime ban actions). The next day, December 6th, sees clear blue skies at London. After breakfast I get the underground straight to Westminster, queue at the general entrance, only to be redirected on a phone call to the House of Lords' separate entrance; so through security and the tour begins just after 9.15am with my personalised guide, Lord Rowlands. Photography is only permitted at certain points.

Lord Rowlands certainly knows his way about with a continuous and informative narrative along the walk. We meet by chance Chris (now Sir Chris) Bryant, MP for the Rhondda constituency and we stop for a chat. Ted and I pose separately before the Jubilee Fountain piece in the lee of Big Ben clock tower and then inside to the great hall and down to the chapel in the crypt where photography is not allowed.

So the tour goes indoors: I pose on the main steps as we leave the great Westminster Hall and into St. Stephen's Hall (where Parliament once met) via the central lobby and through the corridors, already a bustle with staff, visitors, security and into, firstly, the House of Commons (green livery) and then to the House of Lords (red livery), taking in statues, pictures, rooms, artwork etc en route.

Ted had generously sent me the most recent splendidly colour illustrated history of the Houses for prior reading. We note that Sir Josiah John Guest, Merthyr Tydfil's first MP barely lived long enough to see the new Houses of Parliament resurrected after the fire of 1834, still standing today.

On the terrace there are splendid views down river past the London Eye and looking the other way, to the great tower. Time for a tea/coffee break in the Lords' tea room and finally two photo shots of busts of Keir Hardie and Aneurin Bevan, legendary MPs within the pantheon of Labour politics. With an eye on the clock since there is a scheduled all day strike on First Western railway services tomorrow, we both have to make plans to return to South Wales today. And so we do, me much the better educated for that morning's visit.

I have been to Parliament some five or six times, either with respective MPs when I was working at Gorseinon College (Gareth Wardell and Marin Caton, MP severally for the Gower constituency and with the late Hywel Francis, MP for Aberavon), or with a party of visitors and an assigned House guide. Most recently a personalised visit and tour with Gerald Jones, Merthyr Tydfil's current MP was a delight and it was there that Lord Rowlands' name was suggested as *the* definitive tour guide. Everyone at some point should avail themselves of such a visit to Parliament: it should be part of the school national curriculum.

Postscript: Only while boarding the train at Cardiff for Merthyr Tydfil do I realise that I have been wearing my visitor tag throughout. No one reminded me of it. Gross theft from a royal palace, but the item is safely returned in due course through the good offices of Colin Parker.

GREETINGS: come springtide and **RWA** thoughts are turning to, later in the year and perhaps the opportunity to visit the Normandy landing beaches as part of this year's 80th commemorations of that Second

World War initiative as a turning point in early June 1944. Our base would be somewhere near the historic town of Caen which is William the Conqueror country and from which he planned his landing on the shores of England in 1066. As of the moment, prices for accommodation are high, so it could be 2025 for the trip.

This is conceivably the last time that actual participants will be present at D-Day: anyone of such standing would surely be well into his or her nineties if not past a hundred.

Did you know: a certain Mary Lewis who spent some thirty eight years at the BBC ending up as head of pay policy there, before that she was one of an all-female department, the "duplicating section" in charge of all manner of paperwork? A scenario fitting of a novel, cited by David Hendy in his recent history of the BBC, *The BBC: A People's History* (2022) places her at about 10 pm and a phone call asking if anyone is free to do some work. She can oblige on the understanding that the work is highly confidential. She is handed a document to type and run off. It turns out to be "the actual instructions for D-Day." The landings would be taking place the next morning. True or not, such were the heady times of war in preparation for the landings in early June 1944. Supreme Allied Commander General Eisenhower was

going for it once Prime Minister Churchill's shackles on him and his reticence for a strike before that date were now cleared.





Spring has arrived however as I write this, the weather is very changeable and my heating is still on. Last week a friend and I went to The Old Railway Line garden centre. Leaving Merthyr in glorious sunshine, we were proud to have chosen such a great day to go for a nice lunch and a bit of shopping. However, the mountains

were covered with snow and then we hit freezing fog. We were glad to have something hot for lunch at the garden centre.

Our Fellowship enjoyed a Saint David's Day breakfast service of food and worship. One of our members Dr. Humphrey told us about his journey from a Baptist school in Nigeria, medical training and his arrival with his family in Merthyr Tydfil. It was fascinating and we were glad that his son and daughter in law were with us too. Humphrey's faith is fundamental to his life and work, and we are privileged to share our services with him.

We took part in the World Day of Prayer service on March 1st. The service was prepared by women of Palestine some time before the current situation. Our thoughts are with all who are suffering.

We are currently arranging a late spring afternoon tea, a summer trip on the Brecon canal and in celebration of our member Mal Phillips British Empire Medal award, a Sunday lunch out all together.


As a fellowship we believe that we are a church family, supporting, caring and helping each other. Our services at 11.15 are open to all and any new members would be given a warm welcome.

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



